## **BRIDGE HUMOUR**

Many years ago, an Australian representative team travelled to an event on the other side of the world. Australia was a country recognised for its relaxed lifestyle and dangerous creatures but not for its prowess at bridge.

At the entrance to the venue, there was a sign pointing to the location of a notice board. The notice board indicated the names of all the participating teams and an outline of the draw and the playing times for each session.

At the end of week, the Australian team's consistent performance earned them a bronze medal. All the players on the team had contributed equally to achieve such an excellent result.

The next morning, each member packed their belongings and went down to the foyer of the hotel to check out and wait for transportation back to the airport.

Since there was a delay in the taxis arriving, the Australian team representative went back to the notice board that he had seen at the start of the event. The placing of the various teams was listed under a heading called the final results. He glanced at the results and noticed that the team representing the host country had finished last. He turned around to go back to the rest of the team when he noticed the gentlemen who had made the comment when he arrived.

He rather cheekily said, "At least you didn't have to come far".

# Bridge Victoria Operating Committee (BVOC) News for September.

The focus this month has been on launching the Bridge Victoria website. This is a major initiative to match our new organisation with a fit for purpose portal to all things bridge in Victoria for clubs and players. We are depending on Victorian clubs and players to contribute to making this successful.

Another major first is fast approaching - the trialling of a state event at Waverley Bridge Club. Please support the Victorian Swiss Pairs which is to be held face to face at Waverley, Wednesday 8th, 15th, 22nd and 29th of November. We hope this event will be hugely successful.

BVOC met on the 26<sup>th of</sup> September 2023 for their regular operational meeting. The following matters were addressed:

1. **TEACHER ACCREDITATION.** Three teachers were nominated and approved for accreditation based on Bridge Victoria criteria. This increases our accredited teachers to 29, all of whom have contributed significantly to the development of bridge in Victoria for many years.

- 2. **STATE DISCIPLINARY AND ETHICS COMMITTEE VACANCY.** It was proposed and accepted that Bob House (president of the RACV bridge club) fill this vacancy.
- 3. **SUPPORT ROLES.** Two part-time support roles have been identified, one IT role to support the new website functionality and provide IT support to clubs and the other to help with administrative matters such as updating our documents and to assist in promotion activities.
- 4. STRATEGY. Next steps are agreeing specific actions, timelines and responsibilities.
- WEBSITE GO-LIVE. We are launching the new BRIDGE VICTORIA WEBSITE ON SUNDAY 1<sup>sτ</sup> OCTOBER. The aim is to create a one stop portal to all things bridge in Victoria for both clubs and players. It is a work in progress, and we would like constructive feedback and input to make this a valuable site for all.

  - The VBA website will continue to exist, as a signpost to the BV and VBC sites, but also will contain and reflect the governance role of the VBA.

The Victorian Qualifying Points (VQP's) spreadsheet has been updated to 30<sup>th</sup> September. MTC are also finalising the update of the State Regulation information, which will be completed shortly.

#### **MyABF**

The steady increase in My ABF users continues. At the time of writing there are now 15,383 users. Of those 9,173 have registered with their own account and 6,210 have been added as members by their clubs.

All the upcoming national congresses (Canberra in Bloom, Spring Nationals, Golden West Swiss Pairs, GNOT National finals, Summer Festival 2024, Gold Coast 2024) are listed on My ABF and taking entries. There are also an increasing number of club and state events being listed. The long-term aim remains that this page becomes the definitive listing for all major bridge events in Australia rather than having lots of disparate systems at state and club level all around the country, some of which only handle entries and not payment. There are other advantages to a single listing as well:

- As we build up records of events over several years that allows organisers to look at trends.
- It forms a basis for a future national results database.

#### **Duplicate pairs results display**

I have started to get some feedback from players and clubs about the pair's results display. This is great – the more people use and see something the more feedback we get; hence the more we can improve things for you!



When a club publishes results of a session you played in, you get an email notification (you can opt out of this if you wish on your Settings page) with a link to the results. You can also see them on your My ABF dashboard. Here's an example of what it looks like there:

Each of these is a link direct to the session results where your own position is highlighted and from there you can, as usual, view your or any pair's scoresheet and every result on every board played.

The box on your dashboard shows just your 5 most recent results. A more comprehensive view is available through the Results page on your main menu:



That page contains sections showing all your own results, results for your teammates (i.e., people you have defined as teammates in your profile – usually those you play with regularly), all results for your club and all results for all clubs.

Of course, you can only see results from your club if the club chooses to publish them in My ABF. If your club isn't yet publishing its duplicate results why not encourage them to do so?

Note at this stage results display is limited to duplicate pairs. Obviously in time the plan is to accommodate all the common tournament formats as well – Swiss pairs, Swiss teams, knockouts, etc.

#### How clubs become active in My ABF

Of course, the starting point to any of this is for the club to become active in My ABF. All clubs have now been set up in My ABF but to become active a club needs to have an initial administrator who sees their Club Admin menu and can then control who else should have access. Just let us know who you want that to be and your club can be ready to go in a matter of seconds!

#### **Club membership management**

Let me next explain membership aspects a bit more. This is a list of the features around managing members, showing which ones are currently operational and which ones are still to be built.

Set up types of membership for your club.	Available and working
Upload a list of club members (from the masterpoint centre or external sources like Pianola, Compscore or a spreadsheet).	Available and working
Make changes to maintain that list as current.	Available and working

	Built but deliberately not yet made visible so as not to conflict with the masterpoint centre
Send email communications to members or tagged subgroups of them.	Available and working
Use membership status to calculate different member and visitor table money rates for club sessions.	Available and working
Use membership status to calculate different member and visitor entry fees for tournaments.	Not yet available
Track dates for which players' membership is paid up to.	Not yet available
Facilitate payment for member annual renewals (by bridge credits or other means).	Not yet available

What this means is that clubs can maintain a list of their current members and use that list for communications and to calculate table money at club sessions. But they can't yet fully track the history of their members and process their annual renewals.

For a small to medium sized club where members don't change that much this probably isn't much of an issue. For a larger club that's using something like Pianola or Compscore to manage your members you will probably want to continue to use that for now.

Nevertheless, you can still use My ABF. Several larger clubs have uploaded their members, maintained the current list and used it for processing club sessions. Yes, at this stage there is a small amount of extra handling to keep the member listing up to date in My ABF and another system. But the convenience (both for the club and the players) of running club sessions and accepting payment with bridge credits far outweighs that!

#### **Recent work**

In the last couple of months travel and absences by members of the My ABF project team, including myself, has resulted in limited progress on the platform. The Steering Committee is currently reviewing timelines and planned release schedules, such as the highly anticipated 'membership management' enhancements and the "masterpoint" rollout for clubs. Our ambition and hope were to deliver this functionality by the end of this year, but resourcing challenges - yes, this affects us too – are impacting our timelines. We will provide an updated schedule soonest. Stay tuned!

By the way, the My ABF project team is always seeking augmentation. If you know of any Python developers that might be able to lend a hand, please let us know. We are actively looking! Other skills we are always interested in are solution architecture, change management and communications.

How do you get to 6♥?

South opens 2NT 20-22

As North, you bid 3 ♦ as a transfer to ♥s. South bids 3♥.

#### Now what do I bid as North?

An aggressive person might bid 6 + and hope for the best.

A more scientific person might bid 4 + and guess what to do over partner's next bid.

There is no clear answer as partner may have lots of points in s and a doubleton  $\forall$  and missing the top two s.

I don't think it can be bid confidently unless you have a long partnership history of discussing similar auctions and, even then, the slam, played by South, is only reasonable and played by North is less than reasonable.


Your style is 4<sup>th</sup> best and partner leads the .5. You play the .J and South plays the .6. What do you do now? South has an opening hand (or equivalent) with a four-card .5 suit, a .5 stopper, a partial .5 fit presumably and a .5 stopper presumably. Partner has led a .5 rather than a .5, so presumably has more than four .5 clubs and, looking at dummy's pips, probably has a five-card suit. Declarer probably has six .5 tricks, a .5 trick that you can see and a .5 trick making eight tricks. If declarer has the .5 A and the .5 K, there is no chance to defeat it (declarer will take your .5 continuation and eventually lead a .5 towards their .5 K for their ninth trick). The best chance is to play a .5 now and play partner for the .5 QT and the .5 A.

Both sides are Vulnerable when this hand appeared in a team match

The bidding was one of the options in last month's FEEDBACK column.

Whether you agree or not, your job is to make 3NT.

West leads the \$5 and, after East plays the \$T, South wins the \$Q. and then

You lead the  $\blacklozenge$ 7 and West plays the  $\blacklozenge$ Q.

What do you do now?

#### What is your plan from here?

Your best chance is to duck.

You may ask why? Because if ◆s are 2 – 2 you will get six ◆ tricks, two ♣ tricks and three ♠ tricks.

The question is what if West has the  $\diamond Q$  as a singleton and you play the  $\diamond AK$ . You now get only two  $\diamond$  tricks and little chance of nine tricks.

You may say that the defence might be able to cash four ♥ tricks now. Yes, that might be true in an extreme case but ♥s might be 3 – 3 or West has a very difficult ♥ lead from say a doubleton honour.

At pairs, this decision might be harder but at teams this is your best option (if West leads the ♥K from KX now and East has AQJX and defeats you, I would suggest two actions – congratulate West on a great defence and hold your hand closer to your chest on the next hand.

2 is a weak (albeit vulnerable) jump.

West leads the  $\clubsuit$ Q.

#### What is your plan from here?

From the two doubles, it would appear that East has  $\checkmark$  length plus both the minor suit aces (at least).

You can suspect a layout like the one shown.

The first rule in these two-suited hands is to setup the second suit and/or play on a crossruff.

It may be tempting to win the A at trick one and cross to the  $\forall$  A and lead the A, but when East ruffs this trick, you are now in the wrong hand (plus you have weakened your trump holding). If you throw a  $\diamond$ , all East has to do is play another  $\diamond$  to beat you. If you overruff, you are in the wrong hand.

It is a pity that you were dealt the AK, it is a distraction that stops you using the rule outlined above. If you win the AA and lead the AA, what is East to do?

If East wins the A, then depending on what they do next, you limit your losers to three.

If East ducks the A, you can still prevail as well.
