Bridge Victoria Strategy Update

In my last report I highlighted we had put together a strategy, with a range of priorities, all focused on helping grow bridge in Victoria. Since then, we have conducted a survey amongst clubs, to verify the priorities which include:

- Promoting bridge
- Providing support to and materials for teachers
- The development and succession planning of directors.

Bridge Victoria Staffing

To help drive the implementation of our strategy, Bridge Victoria has appointed **Bianca Gold** as BV Clubs Consultant and **Chris Hughes** as BV Operations Manager. Both are well known in the bridge world. Bianca has run her own club and is attuned to the complexities as well as having a keen interest in teaching bridge and youth. Chris is a renowned Australian bridge player, respected throughout the bridge community and brings his wealth of experience to addressing State bridge.

BV Clubs Consultant is the first contact point for clubs. It is the first time in Victoria we will have had dedicated club support. The role encompasses communications with clubs, promotion of events and creating materials that help to manage and grow clubs.

BV Operations Manager will be focused on two areas, managing and growing of state bridge in Victoria, including working with clubs to schedule congresses and ensuring our IT infrastructure is fit for purpose as we grow.

The appointment of Chris and Bianca is a significant step forward for Bridge Victoria. We wish them well in their respective roles.

Director Training

We are aiming to become more regular in the offering of Director training courses. We know this is a significant need in many clubs. Last weekend, Martin Wilcox ran a course in Bendigo. We thank those who attended and Martin, for his efforts in preparing and running the course.

Our next Director training course will be run online, to enable participation from across the state. It will be held on Thursday night's starting on 10th October. Registrations can be made through MyABF.

The RACV Bridge Club operates under the auspices of the RACV City Club - a Club within a Club, some would say a private bridge Club which first commenced with social bridge in1996 and was affiliated with the ABF and Victorian Bridge Association some years later. The Club elected its first President in 2010 and since then the Bridge Club has grown to have around 300 members.

Giving you a brief history of the how the RACV Bridge Congress came to be. After discussion at Committee level, during my term as President of the Bridge Club, it was agreed that I submit a proposal on behalf of the Bridge Club to the RACV City Club itself to hold a Club Congress. This Congress would be open to Club members and outside bridge players. After the proposal was accepted, I sought permission from Victorian Bridge Association to hold a Club Congress and so in August 2014 the RACV Bridge Club held its inaugural Congress. I was appointed Congress Convenor, a title I still have to this day.

Holding a Bridge Red Point Club Congress enables a Bridge Club to become recognised within the bridge world. It showcases the Club environment in which bridge is played together with facilities the Club has to offer it members and guests.

As you are aware the RACV held its inaugural bridge Congress in August 2014 with 24 tables – 96 players. The Congress has been run every year except for the COVID years. The table numbers have increased and at the 2024 Congress 78 pairs played in the event – 156 players. This was the most successful Congress to date with 80 entries in total but two withdrawing due to illness.

The Congress was held on 17th Floor of the RACV City Club which offers stunning views of the city and a very comfortable and light environment in which to play bridge. The Congress was directed by Laurie Kelso assisted by Ben Kingham.

What is good about the RACV Bridge Club Congress, is it attracts bridge players of all levels This has assisted the Congress to grow in entry numbers over the years. It is now recognised as a great Club Congress to attend in Victoria. Bridge Victoria helps promote the Congress and has encouraged us to make it as big as possible.

SALE AND PAYNESVILLE CLUBS

Exciting Revival of the Sale-Paynesville Interclub Shield

In a delightful twist of fate, the Paynesville Bridge Club uncovered a hidden gem during a recent clean-up—the prestigious Sale-Paynesville Interclub Bendigo Bank Shield, last contested in 2014! Originally donated by the local Bendigo Branch the shield has now made a triumphant return, thanks to the enthusiasm of John Haylock, who quickly reactivated this long-dormant competition.

On August 28, the Sale Bridge Club hosted the event, which featured both a **Restricted Section** (for players with fewer than 25 masterpoints) and an **Open Section**. Members of the Sale Bridge Club pulled out all the stops, providing a delicious lunch for all participants, which perfectly complemented the friendly and competitive atmosphere of the day.

Both clubs have a strong history of collaboration, having shared online beginner lessons with Laura Ginnan over the past two years. Earlier this year, new players from Sale visited Paynesville for their first taste of competitive play, and this time, the Paynesville crew made the trip by bus to Sale!

Founded in 1995 with Martin Willcox's help, **the Eastern Region Bridge Association (ERBA)** continues to be a cornerstone of competitive and social bridge in the region. The revival of the Sale-Paynesville Interclub is a testament to ERBA's ongoing impact, fostering connections through congresses, shared lessons, and the simple joy of playing bridge.

A special mention goes to **John Haylock**, who directed the event for the first time, after attending Director instruction days in 2024, sponsored by ERBA and supported by Vic Bridge. He handled the impressive turnout of **17 tables**—10 in the

Open Section and 7 in the Restricted Section—with great success.

For the restricted players, many of whom had only participated in Australia-Wide and ERBA Novice pairs, this was their first face-to-face competition with players from another club. The 7-table movement and shared lunch

welcomed these new players into both the competitive and social aspects of the game. Meanwhile, the open players relished the chance to reconnect, play, and enjoy lunch together.

The event was very successful, with both clubs eager to make the **Sale-Paynesville Interclub** a regular fixture once again and to continue their shared online lessons.

The Victor Champion Cup Championship (VCC) is Victoria's annual opportunity to shine as we proudly host our prestigious ABF Gold Point National Bridge event.

My journey with the VCC began in 2008 when the event was at the Convention Centre, an experience that left such an impression on me that I moved to Melbourne just a year later!

The VCC has been more than just a tournament; it has marked significant moments in my personal and bridge journeys. I remember 2011 vividly when my team achieved an incredible 6th place finish a highlight that prompted me to call my boss and request the next

day off to celebrate! One of my fondest memories is from the 2019 event when my breaks were spent refuelling my 9month-old son, Damon. Amidst the chaos, my team clinched second place, and no day-off requests were necessary this time.


Over the years, I've taken on various roles—player, board dealer, and director. Now, I'm excited to be in the role of Tournament Organiser and I'm committed to bringing a fresh perspective while honouring the rich history of this event. The 2025 Festival promises to be transformative, featuring three significant changes that reflect our growth and evolution.

An Inclusive Identity

A new name. The Victor Champion Cup Championship has grown tremendously since its inception, expanding to include various esteemed competitions. While the Cup has traditionally been allocated to the Teams Championship, we now proudly feature events like the Wally Scott Open Swiss Pairs, the Jim and Norma Borin Mixed Pairs, and the Victor Muntz Restricted Swiss Pairs. To encapsulate this evolution and the broader inclusion of the bridge community, the name **Victorian Festival of Bridge** has been chosen. The Victor Champion Cup will remain the heart of the festival, honouring the legacy of Victor '*Champ*'Champion himself and the longstanding history of the event.

A New Home

In 2025, the Amora Riverwalk Hotel in Richmond will become the new home for the Victorian Festival of Bridge. This 4-star venue is perfectly situated, offering excellent accessibility where you can stay and play onsite. There is a tram stop right outside and paid undercover parking takes you directly to the playing floor. Attendees can look forward to an onsite restaurant and bar, as well as two barista coffee stations and cafes and restaurants nearby. Players can enjoy a specially curated lunch menu from the Reserve Restaurant, ensuring delicious meals, available quickly and at reasonable prices. The venue also features





spacious and luxurious break-out areas, along with a beautiful patio that leads directly to a park and the Yarra River, perfect for leisurely walks and relaxation.

Program Inclusions

By November, we'll finalise the Festival program, ensuring it lives up to its name. A highlight will be the Country Pairs, taking place on Thursday and Friday alongside the other prestigious pairs' events. This competition will be open exclusively to players outside metropolitan areas, fostering connections and competition among regional players from across Australia.

We are also excited to welcome newer players with events including an Under 20 Masterpoint and Under 100 Masterpoint Swiss Pairs, scheduled for Thursday and Friday with single-session formats. These events will include developmental talks to support player development. For those looking for a taste of the Festival in a limited time, we'll also host a variety of single-session events.

To add to the excitement, our social calendar is shaping up with a Trivia Night, Gala Dinner and Jazz Evening, and more!

The 2025 Victorian Festival of Bridge will be a wonderful opportunity for Club Administrators and Red Point Directors to enhance their skills while also joining in the festivities. We're on the lookout for enthusiastic Volunteer Festival Assistants, and you'll find more details on the next page.

As preparations continue, I'll be posting in each bulletin, with information about the 2025 event organisation and the rich history of the Victor Champion Cup. I'm particularly excited to start with an article about Champ himself in the November edition! The **Victorian Festival of Bridge** (formerly Victor Champion Cup Festival) welcomes a new home at the **Amora Riverwalk Hotel** in Richmond in June 2025. As Victoria's premier bridge event, the festival is expanding its offerings for greater inclusivity and is committed to supporting the development of emerging directors, bridge administrators, and tournament organisers.

We are seeking motivated volunteers for Festival Assistant roles, crucial to the smooth running of the event and offering a valuable opportunity to gain insights into bridge directing and event management. Two categories of assistants are being recruited.

1. Floor Staff/Director Development (8 positions available)

- Eligibility: Open to Club Red Point Qualified Directors.
- **Duties**: Assist with floor operations, including board checks, caddying duties, and managing boards in and out of play.
- **Opportunities**: Work closely with the Floor Manager and Directing team. This role provides exposure to National-level rulings and operations, offering hands-on development experience.

2. Customer Service and General Duties Assistant (4 positions available)

- **Duties**: Welcome players, assist with general enquiries, and manage ad hoc tasks.
- **Opportunities**: Collaborate with the Tournament Organiser (Laura Ginnan) and Floor Manager, gaining experience in event management and operations that can be transferred to your club.

- Applicants must be **financial members of the Australian Bridge Federation**
- For the first round of applicants, they must be members of a **Victorian affiliated club**



THE INTERVIEW

THE INTERVIEW THIS MONTH IS WITH BIANCA GOLD

Editor:

Where were you born (you don't need to say the year)?

Bianca:

My parents lived in Mt Gambier, but after a quick flight via air ambulance, my twin sister and I arrived safely in an Adelaide hospital. We stayed in Mt Gambier until I reached high school and then my family relocated to Adelaide.

Editor:

Where did you live and go to school?

Bianca:

In a country town like Mt Gambier, you were either 'in sport' or 'in trouble'. My parents were very sports orientated. My sister and I were in both the state swimming and state athletics team whilst in primary school. I still hold the local record for the 'under 6 girls" shot put.

I went to school at St Martins Lutheran Primary school in its opening year. There were approximately 20 students in the entire school. When we moved to Adelaide, I attended Norwood High. With a wait list of approximately a decade and over 1500 students, it was like being immersed in a new world. Thankfully for sport I survived high school.

Editor:

Did you play card games or something similar at home?

Bianca:

My family consisted of Mum and Dad, my twin sister and myself and a younger brother. We did play card games at swimming meets and on camping trips but since I was training day and night this was not a common occurrence.

Editor:

What other interests did you have as a child?

Bianca:

In my teenage years, my life revolved around water polo. I used to train about six hours a day. This meant that I got up 4:20am and went to the pool before school. As a Centre Forward, [Editor's note: this is the position in front of the goal where the defenders gravitate toward to try and prevent the ball reaching this player]. I regularly stayed behind after morning practice sessions to develop a strong backhand shot. I developed a signature shot, that would scare the strongest goal keepers.





A bad habit picked up while playing water polo was holding my breath, it is interesting to see that I still hold my breath when under pressure at the bridge table.

Editor:

What direction did you take after finishing your education?

Bianca:

My parents were not convinced that I could make a career out of Water Polo. After much thought, I decided to make the most of my opportunities and sponsorship and set up my first business before leaving high school. This business initially consisted of coaching, mentoring, sponsorship deals with sporting companies, public speaking, teaching first aid etc.

The Institute of Sport in South Australia asked me to coach teachers and initiate the first school girls' competition in South Australia. I was part of the big movement to have women's water polo included in the Sydney 2000 Olympics, only 100 years after the men's competition.

This role gave me more confidence to teach, once I had completed my 'Train the Trainers' course.

I continued my business for many years, adding in everything from running a swim school to project management. In 2003, I was competing in Waikiki, unfortunately, I received a career ending injury. I lost my spot in the team and the ongoing medical support was dropped.

However, on my return to physio, I found that western medicine is also unable to help. I withdrew from university and flew back to Adelaide.

Editor:

Wow. My sporting career consisted of whether I make the reserve team or no team at all. The small advantage is that I never got a career ending injury as I didn't have a career in the first place.

When did you get involved in the local bridge scene and what prompted you to start playing?

Bianca:

Enter my knight in shining armour! Leigh did not know about my world and I certainly

did not know or understand his. [Editor's note: Obviously, a match made in heaven 🙂].

As a now physically injured athlete, I met Leigh when he needed marketing & project management support in the feasibility study for an International Bridge Competition. Despite the event not being feasible, I decided that Leigh was!

After we relocated to Melbourne in 2006, I decided if you 'can't beat them join them'. Leigh had a couple of attempts to get me to play using a couple of teachers. Although some may thrive in the small groups, I found that most of the attendees knew what the next bid should be when questioned. The fact that I didn't know terrified me. I didn't feel comfortable making mistakes in front of other people until I grasped the basics. Leigh made up a game, '2 player bridge' until I had the confidence to formally learn.

Unfortunately, as I was never taught about bridge etiquette and expectations at the table (including 'director calls'), when I ventured into the bridge world, it led to a series of 'bad experiences'. I then decided that bridge was not for me.

Editor:

This is a common situation. Beginners need to be taught the basics of how to play the game but also what other things they might experience during play at a club. It can be very daunting and my <u>wife</u> often relates to our friends her experiences the first time she played in an event. That was the first and only time and she hasn't played since. I try to explain to her that the opponent's director call was correct in the circumstances but she will not be convinced.

What did you do at that stage?

Bianca:

While Leigh was playing for Victoria in the Australian National Championships in Western Australia, I happened to meet Allison Stralow, who is now President of the Australian Bridge Federation. She wanted to



know why I wasn't playing. She convinced me to have a game with a youth player, wanting me to at least find the joy in the game.

I coined the phrase 'Don't let your last hand be your opponent's last game' She was so enthusiastic about this quote that she asked me to write an article expressing my views on table etiquette.

[Editor's note: this fits in well with some of the articles in this bulletin as we are currently trying to further promote these concepts at all levels].

Editor:

What local results and achievements are you most proud of (playing and/or administration)?

Bianca:

I dabbled in bridge when we returned from Western Australia.

One day, Neil Ewart and Blaine Howe asked if I would be their female player in a last-minute decision for a mixed team with Leigh as my partner. Unfortunately for teams 1,2,3, and 4, they were all very close going into the last round. Placed 5th, we had a maximum win in the last round to walk away with the state title. Despite the newspaper article headed "Beginner wins state title", I was quite sheepish, as I was very fortunate to play with 3 experts and we had a bit of luck in the last round.

Therefore, when I say to Leigh that I don't want to play in an event, he will reply that I am a 'state champion' what is your problem.

When my son was a baby, I travelled with Leigh to the Gold Coast to become the 5th member of a youth bridge team. The deal was, if you were out for the set, you became the babysitter. Ben Kingham not only impressed me at the bridge table but I knew he was going to be a great father one day (or at least a great babysitter). Our team made the grand final of the event. I met my future bridge partner from the opposing team. It was a lose-win (or maybe a win-win).

I thought winning a state title and a second place in a national event should be all that I can want, but the GFC had other ideas.

In 2009; Leigh played in the Open Australian team, the birth of our son Taydon and the birth of our bridge club 'Tricks and Trumps'. Starting a club from scratch without any money, away from our local area was always going to be difficult. However, we wanted to open a club where there was a void proved to be challenging for many reasons. Therefore, to succeed can be very rewarding. I can really sympathise with the potential issues facing small clubs and country clubs.

We wrote articles for the local newspaper, ran lessons, congresses and did everything the hard way. After ten years of congresses, I hope in the future that I can assist other clubs in running a successful congress for their club and community.

Editor:

What is your preferred bidding system and why?

Bianca:

Relatively new to bridge, I didn't mesh with a lot of the number formulae for bidding. I was a person that liked to know the bigger picture, but why? When Leigh started to teach at our club, I quickly took over and often I offered ways that I memorized concepts. (for example, 'length is more important than strength') and then I would draw charts on the white board.

When I learnt basic bridge, within a week, Leigh told me I had to 'unlearn' my major raises, or I would land in bad games and miss skinny good games. Wanting to know why no-trump raises was not taught from the start as it would have been easier, he said 'because that is just standard practice to teach limit raises in a beginner's lesson'.

At this stage the athlete in me emerged, I wanted efficiency and accuracy without confusing learners. We thought no-trump raises was the best bidding system for beginner and novice learners and trialled it on our next class with much success. During this time at the club, we started to write a book on '2 player bridge' aligning it with the school curriculum.



Over the years, I tended to fill in where needed, so I essentially played any system my instant partner wanted to play.

Editor:

What is your general style at the bridge table?

Bianca:

My style is definitely relaxed, I like a happy table if possible. My favourite bridge partner, (shout out Tere Wotherspoon) is also an ex-athlete, with a successful daughter playing in the AFLW. I am hoping he will be down in Melbourne more often to have a game face-to-face. I think my biggest style is incognito as I will never put my surname on my system card as I didn't learn through osmosis.

Editor:

Perhaps, definitely relaxed except in a slam where you struggle to breath. 😉

Obviously, mental awareness is important but do you believe that physical well-being is a significant factor in doing well at bridge and in the administration arena as you age?

Bianca:

Interesting question, I certainly do not look as fit and fierce as I did whilst an athlete, nor do I think I would have the stamina to sit for hours at a time whilst training 6 hours a day.

When I first started bridge, I was working in Project Management and thought I would rather work for 8-9 hours without a break than play for 2.5 hours at the bridge table. However, once I understood that I couldn't learn everything within a couple of months, I managed my expectations and I felt much better.

Editor:

What are your goals in bridge?

Bianca:

To be honest, most of my goals now are about increasing the numbers of bridge players. Give competition players something to play for again. It doesn't matter whether that be entry into another event, an all-expenses paid trip to an interstate or international event or a free session with a professional player. I have noticed that the Waverley Bridge club just ran a large event with over \$1,000 in prize money. Bring it on!

I would like to look into other segments of our community that would love the game. This might include school children, university students, corporate people, semi-retired as well as ex athletes and ex-service men and women.

Encourage and assist our current players to continue to improve their game and bring the competition back to our clubs. Bring meaning back to Master Points and the achievements and recognition that come with this. In my new role, I would love to:

- help inexperienced teachers
- assist clubs in finding and keeping volunteers,
- assist clubs in encouraging congress play and running a congress for profit
- showing clubs how they can utilise their local council, media outlets and gain awareness
- using the clubs' awareness and success to gain sponsors and new players

Editor:

Thank you for your time in answering my questions.

This interview should give the reader a very good insight into your aims for your new appointment. I wish you good luck in this role.








Smile Sweetly after Disaster

One of my favourite hands comes from the 1989 Victor Champion Cup, a National Teams event initially held Adelaide. My partner was Zibi Zeb, a representative of the Polish Junior Team in the 1980s, who was visiting Australia. On our Convention Card, he added "Smile Sweetly After Disaster" as one of our conventions.

Our opponents in the first match were two top players from the leading team whose big weakness was their temperament.



Our bidding sequence was not quite perfect. Zibi who had me playing a Krakow version of Polish Club, opened 2NT to show either a weak preempt in a minor or a good preempt in a major.

East overcalled 4^v, and having no system notes to deal with interference over the Krakow 2NT, I bid 4[±] on the assumption that my shortage there indicated that partner would surely have long spades. When West doubled, I had some concern, so I played safe by redoubling, hopefully for rescue, to "ensure" that partner bid his suit. You might think that 4NT would have been more prudent, but the outcome was about to become strangely satisfying.

July 2017

West led ***4** to the king, East switched to **+3** to my king and West's ace, and West switched to a spade to the ace and another to the jack. West played another heart, which I ruffed in dummy. Only now did I play clubs, playing **±**Q from dummy.

East thought for a while about my apparent club finesse, then discarded a heart, letting me win Ato escape for a mere penalty of 4000. Had I not played the hand so carefully, I would have gone for 4600.

Zibi greeted me with a beaming smile and got on with the next board as if nothing had happened. In return, I managed the best smile I could. Then it started...

East: "Why didn't you ruff the club? You blithering idiot, I've had a plus 4000 before, but 4600 would have been my highest score ever."

West: "But why didn't you exit a spade so that I knew what was going on? Or you could have ducked the diamond to my ten? You blame ME?"

East: "You're just an imbecile. Even a moron could have seen what was going on."

And on and on it went, as they abused each other.

At the other table, our team mates had reached 6[•]. The declarer, David Beauchamp, ruffed the club lead, played a heart to the queen then made the vital move of a spade to the ace, before South realised that it was necessary to unblock $extsf{eq}$ under the ace. Now three rounds of diamonds, taking the finesse, followed by a spade exit, end-played South, who had to concede a ruff and discard. Plus 920 reduced the loss on the board to only 23 IMPs.

This was the first board of a 20 board match. The datum (i.e. "our table") score for the match was 86 – 24 IMPs in our favour. Zibi and I outscored them by 86 to 0 on the remaining 19 boards, because they were so upset with each other leading to a maximum win.

I recommend the Smile Sweetly agreement to all bridge players.

Now it is not clear who can make what and their 5 may make (which it does) and your 5 may make or be a cheap save (insurance).

WHAT NEXT IN DEFENCE - OCTOBER SOLUTION

Playing in a team's match where beating the contract is your main concern (overtricks are secondary).

You are defending against a North-South contract of 4 by South. Your partner and yourself are playing reverse count (where high-low is odd and low-high is even).

You, as West, lead the ♥Q, dummy plays the ♥5, partner the ♥9 and declarer wins with ♥K.

Declarer plays the $\diamond 2$ and dummy the $\diamond J$ and partner wins the $\diamond K$. Partner now switches to the $\diamond 9$ and declarer plays the $\diamond K$.

What is your plan?

What do you know about the hand? Partner's \forall 9 shows an odd number. Therefore, declarer has only two \forall s (declarer can't have four \forall s, as declarer denied this in the auction).

Partner's \blacklozenge 9 denies an honour. Therefore, declarer has the \blacklozenge KQT. If you win this trick, the defence is stymied. You can't return a \blacklozenge and if you play anything else, declarer can throw the \blacklozenge T on a high \clubsuit .

If declarer has the AK, the hand can't be beaten. Therefore, assume your partner holds this card. The answer now becomes clear. You duck this trick and when partner gets in with the AK, they can return another \diamond


The four hands must be very similar to the setup shown above.

Editor's note: Dee Harley, whilst proofreading the bulletin (thank you Dee) made a very interesting and valid comment. If you sit for a while and duck the \blacklozenge K, it is likely to give Unauthorised Information (UI) to partner. This is a hand where you should have done all the thinking beforehand (this sort of thing is a concept that makes defending tougher than it already is).

With both sides vulnerable, the auction proceeds as shown. Where 4♣ was a cue bid showing support for ♠s and 5♥ showed 2 key cards.

A little aggressive 6 h became the final contract.

West leads the $\forall A$ and continues with a small \forall to East's Q.

You ruff and pull the three rounds of trumps to remove all the outstanding trumps (West had JT7).

You are in your hand.

What is your plan from here?

'Eight ever and nine never' is a good saying for a general rule. However, general rules need to be guidelines at bridge.

East opened the bidding and West has shown up with the $\forall A$ and the $\clubsuit J$.

Your hand has fifteen points, West has shown up with five points and dummy has nine points. That is a total of twenty-nine points.


Who has the \blacklozenge Q?

Lead the 4 to the A and then play the 4 J running it if the 4 Q does not appear. Your losing 4 is thrown on dummy's fifth 4.

Both sides nil vulnerable in a pair's match

West leads the 4 (your 14 opening could be as few as two cards).

East plays the \$9 and you win with the \$T. At trick two, you lead the $\forall Q$ and East wins with the $\forall K$.

East now leads the AQ.

What is your plan from here?

[Hint – the ♥ suit is divided 3 -3]

West led the 46 at trick one, so presumably West has four or five 4.5. When East got the lead at trick 2, East led the AQ (which is presumably from a touching honour sequence of at least four cards in length. However, West with a four-card A suit might have led a A in this sequence rather than away form a KJ sequence into the opening 1.4 bid).

Therefore, the hand could well be similar to the one shown (East may have one more \clubsuit and one less \blacklozenge or

♦ (with the location of the ♦K unknown).

Duck the 🙏 Q and

- a) with a ♠ continuation, you win the ♠K and cash the ♥s and the ♠A and lead a small ♣. What is West to do now?
- b) If East switches to a ◆ rather than continuing with a ♠, you play the ♦9 and West wins and must exit with a major suit. You then cash the ♠K and cash the ♥s and the ♠A and lead a small ♣. What is West to do now?
